> This interview is pertinent for teachers of Kansas History or Geography for middle school children. The study guide is based on the attached transcript.



Sample Compelling Questions include:

- What role did railroads play in the westward expansion of the country in the 19th Century?
- How did the bankruptcy of the Rock Island Line impact Kansas and Kansans?
- What problem did the 4-R Act try to resolve? How effective was the solution?
- Why would the bankruptcy of an Eastern railroad have an impact on the railroads in the West?

Use this STUDY GUIDE to Learn more about Railroads:

- ١. Discuss the impact of railroads on Western settlement patterns.
 - a. Railroads fundamentally changed American society as they facilitated the movement of goods and people, opening up the West. For discussion of these concepts, see USAHistoryTimeline.com
 - b. Cattle companies moved to Kansas to locate along the railroads. Dodge City was established in 1872 before the railroad arrived in 1873. Land values increased 300% after the arrival of the railroad to move cattle to markets.
 - c. "[Railroads] served as instruments of migration and cultural exchange while ...disrupting indigenous communities and altering land use."1
